A non-Jewish friend of mine used to babysit for a very orthodox family as a teenager. She remembers going over once and their cutlery was stuck in the ground outside the house – have you any idea what this was about?



It relates to the idea (based on a rabbinic interpretation of a biblical verse) of not mixing foods that have milk and meat products in them e.g., having beef with mashed potatoes using milk.

The same ban was extended to using the same cutlery for milk and meat foods, and instead, one has to have two separate sets. However, if you accidentally use a meat fork for a milk product, then the fork has to be made kosher through a special process.

If it is a metal fork (or other implement), it is left in the ground for three days, then thoroughly cleaned and then considered kosher, and can be used again.

Reform Judaism leaves the idea of separating milk and meat foods (and cutlery) as a matter of personal choice. However, if you do keep those rules and accidentally mix up the cutlery, I would advise that giving them a thorough cleaning is sufficient.

In your friend's case, as there were so many items, it seems that an accident of some sort happened, such as someone spilling a jug of milk over several pieces of meat cutlery.

Alternatively, perhaps they had simply saved up individual items from periodic errors and then cleaned them all in one go.

I have acquired a campervan. Does it need a mezuzah on it?



It all depends on how long you are using it and whether it constitutes your home.

The official definition is that a building does not need a mezuzah unless you spend 30 days or more in it. So, for instance, a sukkah or hotel room does not need it, nor would your van for a three-week holiday. However, if you were to have a lengthy consecutive stay in it (e.g., a three-month European tour) or use it as a permanent home, then it should have a mezuzah.

It should be put on the entrance that you use for the living quarters, rather than a driving door. The normal blessing should be said (which can be found on pages 436 to 437 of the *Daily and Sabbath Prayer Book*), while a mezuzah itself can be obtained from the Synagogue's Kosher Shop or online.

# YIT<sub>R</sub>8

The Torah portion for 3 February 2024 is Yitro. He was a Midianite priest and father-in-law to Moses. He is credited with teaching Moses time management when handling a large and rowdy group of Jews. His efforts were so important to the overall mission that this portion includes The Ten Commandments, which will be our Torah portion reading.

So, what can I say that you don't already know? After all, we all learned The Ten Commandments in childhood, and we've all seen the film; we are all experts on the subject.

Let's start with the first commandment (Exod. 20:2), "I am The Lord your G-d who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the land of slavery."

OK, do you see it? Look again! What exactly is the commandment here? The Ramban states that the commandment is to know and believe that The Eternal exists and He is your G-d. Compared to the 'other nine' such as *Don't murder*, *Remember Shabbat*, or *You shall have no other gods but Me*, at best, this verse implies a commandment, but I ask, is this a commandment?

What are we to make of the name Ten Commandments? Should we change it to the nine commandments, or is it better to keep it as it is, and it'll be our little secret? We could adopt the HeParashah Yitro – Exodus 18:1–20:23. This parashah tells of Jethro's organizational counsel to Moses and God's revelation of the Ten Commandments to the Israelites at Mount Sinai.

brew name, which translates as 'The Ten Utterances.'

Perhaps the event at which The Ten Commandments were established included a more meaningful sign of G-d's existence than the written word.

We turn to (Exod. 19:16–19) "On the third day as morning dawned, there was thunder and lightning and a dense cloud upon the mountain and a very loud horn blast. All the people in the camp trembled. Mount Sinai was all in smoke, for The Lord came down upon it in fire. The smoke rose like the smoke of a kiln, and the whole mountain trembled violently. The blare of the horn grew louder and louder." At Sinai, all the people witnessed the most extraordinary event as described above, culminating with (Exod. 20:1), "G-d spoke all these words saying ...".

As her cancer progressed, she stepped back from many responsibilities, but her love of education, and Jewish education in particular, meant that resigning from her employment with the synagogue was one of the last steps back that she took.

There are countless people reading this whose lives she will have touched, either because she taught you or she taught your children. She took such delight in doing that, in reinforcing the Judaism of the children of so many, in giving those children knowledge of their religion to be able to un-



derstand it and to make informed choices as they grew to adulthood, which many of them have now done. ...

## HONOUR NICHOLAS WINTON

## **BY DOING YOUR BIT TO HELP**

## THOSE IN NEED

If anyone did not already know why Sir Nicholas Winton's name is mentioned with awe, then they soon will do when they see the publicity surrounding the film about him, *One Life*, which is being released this week.

The title is misleading as it refers, not to his life, but to the rabbinic saying "The person who saves one life is as if he had saved an entire world."

It became well-known after 1994 when it featured in the film *Schindler's List*. The words were engraved on a gold ring that Jews, saved from extermination camps by Oskar Schindler, gave him as a token of appreciation.

This connection between the two men is not accidental, for

Winton is often described as 'the British Schindler' for spiriting 669 children, largely Jewish, out of Prague just before World War II broke out, bringing them to safety in Britain. It is estimated that their descendants number around 4,000 individual worlds today.

But was he in the same league as Schindler? In some ways, the answer may be 'no'. Schindler saved many more from certain death, as did the Swedish businessman, Raoul Wallenberg, the British Intelligence Officer, Frank Foley, and the Portuguese and Japanese diplomats, Aristides de Sousa Mendes and Chiune Sugihara.

In addition, unlike these men, all acting in war-time Europe, Winton was never in personal danger, for after an initial visit to Prague, he then conducted operations from London.

But heroism can be backroom as well as frontline, while Winton surely ranks higher than most people who looked on, sighed and failed to act.

He often claimed that he did nothing special and just what any other person could have done. But the reality is that they did not do so, whereas he did. His light may not be the very brightest in the firmament, but it certainly shines out.

The same modest practicality that made Winton uncomfortable with the adulation he received, would also have caused him some dismay at the showing of this film.

Having got to know him well in his later years, I can hear his voice ring out: Don't concentrate on what I did back then, think of what you can do now. Look around at who needs help today and do something about it.

There is a danger that celebrat-

ing the heroism of the past can be a way of averting our gaze from the present. The former should inspire the latter, not sap our attention from it.

If we want to honour Winton best, then we will not go home from the cinema but off to a foodbank, refugee shelter or other charitable endeavour and help the many worlds crying out for help in our time.

My lovely wife, Hilary Harris, lost her battle against cancer in December 2023.

I was obviously immensely saddened by that, but I have also been saddened by the shul members who have contacted me to say that they wished they had known the sad news in time to attend the *levoyeh* or the shiva.

The shul has a list of people who have opted in for "Sad News" emails to be notified almost immediately when someone passes away. I believe we have 921 families who are members. Fifty-three people have opted to be on that email list.

I am one of those 53 and have been since the option was there. I am so pleased to say that I don't get many emails, and I simply delete most of the emails I do get, as I don't know the departed or their family. But every now and again, the email prompts me to email a mourner or, go to a shiva, or more.

My first plea is to you, reading this. Are you one of the 53? If so, well done you. If not, then why not email the admin team at the shul and ask to be added to the list? It's not hard to delete an email, but it is hard to miss a *levoyeh* or a shiva to which you otherwise might have gone – there are no second chances.

My second plea is for the policy to be flipped on its head – make members opt out if they want to rather than gently encouraging them to opt in. I know that Hilary felt that way too. But don't make the change for me or for her. Make it for the people who are sad that they did not have the opportunity to pay their respects.

That may be you someday. Mark Harris

I was born in Johannesburg, South Africa, and then we moved to Vienna because of my Dad's work. He was a consultant, but he was also involved in setting up a Reform community in Vienna. It was a total contrast to South Africa, where 90percent of the people I knew were non-Jewish.

My background has always been Reform. Even when my grandparents left Germany to move to South Africa, they were part of the Reform synagogue in Port Elizabeth, on the Eastern Cape. In 1996, I came to the UK to study at Leeds University. After I got engaged to Mark, who is now my husband, he decided to convert to Judaism.

We were living in London at the time, and when we were looking to move out of the city, we heard that Jonathan was very supportive of interfaith marriages.

We knew we wanted to be in a decentsized Reform community, so we actually made the choice to live in Maidenhead based on the synagogue being in this area. We've been members for 20 years now.

I think if we don't support interfaith marriages, we will be a shrinking community,



and we'll end up as an aging community. So many people have abandoned the religion because of a lack of support. Almost all my friends at synagogue are in interfaith marriages – some have converted, some have not.

Thanks to Jonathan, this community is accepting and encouraging for all family members who wish to be involved in Jewish life.
