I am taking the family to Jerusalem in the summer and I wondered if there is any specific protocol for visiting the Western Wall? In particular, is there a specific prayer we should recite? Is it traditional/necessary to wear a tallit when praying at the Wall and when touching it? Do the airls have to cover their heads when entering the female prayer area to touch the Wall?



When you approach the main area where the Kotel ('the Wall') is situated, it is traditional to say Psalm 48, as it starts off: "Great is the Lord and highly to be praised in the city of our God" and goes

on to refer to Mount Zion, while it later says (almost as if a guidebook): "Walk about Zion and go round about her. Count her towers and mark her ramparts."

You could make a photocopy of the Psalm and take it with you, though I believe it is also on a plaque by the main entrance points.

If you prefer something more modern.

Yehuda Amichai's wonderful poem about Jerusalem, to be found on p. 566 of our current Prayer Book, starts: "Jerusalem is a port city on the shore of eternity" and ends up "Ierusalem is the Venice of God."

There is no special prayer or blessing you have to say, though there is a blessing for doing something special or

for the first time that year, so maybe you could say that one (the shehecheyanu which can be found on p. 411 of our current Prayer Book.)

A tallit is worn if you attend a formal daytime service or say some of the daily prayers by yourself, but not just for a visit and a blessing.

As you are aware, the main section of the Kotel is controlled by the Orthodox authorities, so they impose their rules as to women's attire. Women are expected to cover their heads, though only if they are married, while, of course, all women are restricted to the women's section. They also expect a woman's body to be largely covered and for them to be wearing "modest clothing." This all

applies to the main section, though there is a Progressive section where conditions are more relaxed. It is away from that main area, so it is less atmospheric. To find the Progressive section, if you are facing the main wall, it is to the far right (head to the Archaeological Garden in the southern section of the Wall).

The Torah portion for 2 March 2024 is Ki Tisa, and we will be focusing on Exodus 32:1-14.

This is one of the most famous Biblical stories, 'The sin of the golden calf.' As is so often the case when discussing the bible, being a famous story does not necessarily imply that its meaning is obvious upon the first reading.

So, let's refresh our memories. Moses is atop Mount Sinai for 40 days and 40 nights. At the end of this period, he fails to return, so the people demand of Aaron a new G-d. A golden calf is produced, the people bowed and prayed, and G-d is not very impressed. Let's not forget just before this incident, G-d gave two tablets of stone containing the Ten Commandments engraved by the finger of G-d to Moses!

Now, it is the nature of most humans that we tend not only to learn, but also to absorb life's lessons as a result of hard times versus times of plenty. I have, at times, fallen into life's challenges, and I am sure most of you have your fair share of stories to tell. Let me ask, in your story, is it how you feel, or is it about how you raised yourself up that you focus upon?

If you were one of the Israelites caught up in the making of the golden calf, what would you want

Parashah Ki Tisa – Exodus 30:11–34:35. This parashah tells of building the Tabernacle, the incident of the golden calf, the request of Moses for G-d to reveal G-d's Attributes, and how Moses became radiant.

future generations to take away from your experience?

Many rabbis would note that the name of the Torah portion is indicative of its overall meaning. The name 'Ki Tisa' is related to a half-shekel contribution everyone brought. As well as raising funds for communal projects, it enabled Moses and the leadership a means to take a census. Simply put, if everyone gives a coin, you just count coins, and there's your headcount.

The name 'Ki Tisa' can also mean to raise or lift up. Now this phrase appears in Exodus 30:12 and by employing our alternate meaning, "When you lift up the

heads of the children of Israel", we learn that the sin of the golden calf ultimately led our ancestors and us to atonement and forgiveness.

The Torah reminds us that setbacks are 'golden' opportunities to raise ourselves up to greater heights than we previously thought possible.

WHAT IS PURIM?

Purim, a joyous Jewish festival celebrated on the 14th day of the Hebrew month of Adar, commemorates the salvation of the Jewish people from Haman's plot to annihilate them in ancient Persia.



The history of Purim is primarily derived

HOW DO WE CELEBRATE?

The celebratory customs include dressing up for the Purim service, giving to charity, exchanging gifts (mishloach manot), sharing festive meals, and partaking in lively Purim plays and parades.

Ganon hamantaschen

from Sheila Veniar

Purim is always our favourite festival at Ganon, and every year as well as dressing up and seeing Haman off, the children enjoy making hamantaschen.

Pastry ingredients

- · 3oz/75g butter
- · 20z/50g white vegetable fat, e.g. Trex
- · 4oz/110g self-raising flour
- · 4oz/110g plain flour
- · I thsp icing sugar
- · I egg yolk
- · 2 tbsp water

- · chocolate chips (the most popular filling with the little ones!)
- · apricot or strawberry jam
- · glaze
- · I egg white

Cut the fats into cubes and rub into flour, either by hand or using a food processor, until the mixture looks like bread crumbs. Add the icing sugar. Blend the egg yolk with the water and add this to the mixture.

Form into a ball and knead lightly until smooth. Chill for 30 minutes.

Preheat oven to 200°C/400°F/Gas 6. Roll out the pastry on a surface dusted with icing sugar and cut out three inch circles.

In the middle put a spoonful of your chosen filling and then fold the sides to form a triangle shape. Pinch the edges together and put on a lined baking tray.

Whisk the egg white and paint over the hamantaschen. If desired, they can then be spinkled with a little granulated sugar before baking for 20 minutes until golden brown.

NEW EXHIBIT IN THE KIDDUSH HALL


The new art installation in the Kiddush Hall features works from Rhoda Hodes (1932-2014). She was the mother of Maidenhead member Tamar Hodes.

I visited this innovative and moving art installation outside of JW3, the Jewish Community Centre in London, on 11 February, shortly after it opened to the public.


Conceived by Marcel Knobil, Lovelock Hostage Bridge was designed to bring continued attention to the plight of the hostages held since 7 October.





PEOPLE IN ENGLAND WITH JEWISH **ANCESTRY TO BE OFFERED BRCA TEST**

Tens of thousands of people in England with Jewish ancestry, who have a higher risk of developing certain cancers, are to be offered a genetic test on the NHS.

People with Jewish ancestry are about six times more likely to carry faults in their BRCA genes than the general population. The new scheme forms part of a national drive by health leaders to identify more people with a higher risk of cancer, in an effort to spot and treat the disease earlier.

BRCA refers to two genes, BRCA1 and BRCA2, which repair DNA damage and normally help to protect against cancer. Some people are born with a fault in one of the genes, which increases their likelihood of developing certain cancers, including breast, ovarian, prostate and pancreatic cancer

A fault in one of the BRCA genes affects about one in 400 people, but the NHS said people with Jewish ancestry were six times more likely to carry the faults.

NHS England is introducing a

national BRCA gene testing programme to pick up changes that push up cancer risk, with anyone over 18 with Jewish ancestry offered a simple saliva test. Saliva samples are done at home and then sent to a lab for testing.

Anyone with a Jewish grandparent can register for a saliva kit to be sent to them by visiting http://jewishbrca.org

The programme aims to identify thousands more people carrying faults in the BRCA genes over the next two years. These people would be able to have regular scans to check for tumour growth and access treatment more quickly if necessary.

NHS England expects to test about 30,000 people over the next two years.
