Monthly Musings From Rabbi Rene

Moving beyond conflict

I spent the last week of February in Israel, where I joined a group of UK rabbis led by Yachad UK. We visited the Nova Festival site. where 440 kids were slaughtered after a night of partying, spoke with residents of Kibbutz Nirim, heard one man talk about the harrowing hours he tried to keep his family safe from Hamas, and travelled to the West Bank.

We witnessed a village destroyed by settlers following October 7, part of a larger pattern affecting 15 villages. A settler attempted to run us over with his truck, and later, in Hebron, we faced verbal abuse from settlers' children. We also met with peace activists, Palestinians and Israelis, who, despite the absence of trust, are trying to keep the communication open, and to imagine a better



future together.

The complexity of this conflict is the two narratives that it. presents. We saw the Israeli perspective when we visited the Nova Festival site, with all these young lives cut short, and the city of Sderot, where Hamas killed 80 people, leading to the evacuation of a kibbutz for security reasons. In total, over 1,200 individuals were brutally slaughtered by Hamas, and 250 were taken



hostage.

Lattended a forum for the families of hostages near the Israeli Prime Minister's residence on the day the Bibas family was buried, where we released orange balloons in their memory. The photos of the smiling babies and their mother will haunt me until my last day. The trauma in the country is profound, and the ongoing captivity of hostages in Gaza complicates the grieving process.

A settler attempted to run us over with his truck, and we faced verbal abuse from settlers' children.

From the Palestinian perspective, we observed the devastation in northern Gaza, where hundreds of thousands are displaced in a confined area. We saw one of many villages destroyed by settlers

without repercussions from the police or the army, who don't defend them. In Hebron, we witnessed two Palestinian girls being physically abused by the children of the settlers. These kids spat at us, insulted us, and threw eggs at us.

Many people seem incapable of thinking through complexity and can only see one perspective. Some perceive Palestinians as terrorists intent on killing all Jews, while others view Israel as a rogue state committing ethnic cleansing against a vulnerable population.

Both perspectives seem irreconcilable, and yet, each contains some elements of truth. Hamas, supported by Iran, seeks to destroy Israel, while some settlers in the West Bank and far-right members of the Israeli Knesset aim to resolve the Palestinian issue

through the expulsion of all non-Jewish inhabitants through terror.

The trauma in Israel is profound, and the ongoing captivity of hostages in Gaza complicates the grieving process.

After my trip, I realised we need a new approach to discussing the situation. We must find fresh language, identify the root causes, and embrace complexity, by considering several key factors, such as:

Historical narratives: Israelis and Palestinians have strong narratives



that shape their views, Shoah versus Nakbah. These narratives often clash, making it hard to find common ground, as they are both rooted in suffering. The region is also very important for Jews, Muslims, and Christians, adding to its complexity.

Land and territory: Disputes over land ownership of this region are at the heart of the conflict. Competing claims to the same territory, including Jerusalem, worsen tensions and aggravate security concerns. The most vocal members of both Israeli and Palestinian society are the most radical on both sides - those who do not want peace.

Security concerns: Israel's security worries come from Palestinian terrorist attacks and shape its policies toward them. Likewise, Palestinians have security issues linked to Israeli military actions, to settlers' violence in the West Bank and overall movement limits. There are now about 800 checkpoints in the West Bank.

International involvement: The conflict draws international attention. Many countries and organisations often focus on their own interests, rather than true conflict resolution

To build a constructive narrative, we must move beyond "us versus them" frameworks. We need a more nuanced, empathetic, and future-oriented approach:

Acknowledge shared humanity:

Recognise the humanity in every human being and acknowledge the pain felt by both Israelis and Palestinians.

Promote dialogue: Create chances for meaningful conversations, active listening, and building trust. Right now, trust is in tatters, and without that, nothing is possible.

Emphasise interconnectedness:

Remind both sides that their futures are linked; peace requires cooperation. As one man told us, either we will learn how to live together, or we will die together. The rights and dignity of both

Israelis and Palestinians need to be upheld.

Move beyond blame: Focus on finding solutions, rather than blaming past actions. Maybe it is time to go beyond historical traumas that hinder any chance of a future free from suffering.

Build a future-oriented vision.

Imagine a shared future and use language that goes beyond conflict.

By weaving these ideas into a new narrative, we can break harmful cycles and create a hopeful path forward.

We have seen this method work in Northern Ireland, France, and Germany. There is no other choice - not for them, or for us, as everything that happens in the Middle East impacts our own security here in Europe.

The Torah portion for 5th April is Vayikra. It is also the first portion of the third book of the Holy Bible, which in English, we call Leviticus. This book deals with the Tabernacle, which the children of Israel built in Sinai and which was later replaced by the Temple that Solomon built in Jerusalem.

The activities in the Tabernacle were conducted by the priests, who were all Levites -hence the name Leviticus. Technically speaking, not all Levites qualify for the priesthood: they all must be descendants of Aaron and his sons. Aaron, Moses's brother, was the first priest and was chosen by G-d. In Hebrew, the name of the first portion is also the name of

the book, so that word would have deep significance that permeates beyond one weekly portion.

What activities occurred there? Our portion begins (Lev. 1:1) "He (G-d) called out to Moses and G-d spoke to him from the Tent of Meeting." The literal meaning is that G-d would speak to Moses from here. To be specific, the Tent of Meeting was a rectangular structure that was divided into one section called 'Holy' and a second section, 'Holy of Holies', which contained the Holy Ark and The Ten Commandments. Moses would hear the voice of G-d emanating from above the Ark cover.

The Tabernacle also included

Parashah Vayikra – Leviticus 1:1-5:26 – The parashah describes how God informs Moses about the sacrifices offered in the Mishkan (Tabernacle).

two altars: a gold altar for burning incense and a copper altar for sacrifices, which could be an animal, such as a cow or sheep, or a bird such as a dove, or flour, usually mixed with oil. In general, sacrifices included burnt offering, sin offering, guilt offering and peace offering. The sacrifice must be of the highest quality and actioned with focused intent by all involved, contemplating on the sacrifice and the significance of their offering. In Hebrew, a sacrifice is korban, and is a procedure that brings one closer to G-d.

Perhaps the most enigmatic

function of the Tabernacle as stated in the Torah (Exodus 25:8) is: "They shall make a sanctuary for me, so that I may dwell amongst them." This verse, our sages inform us, alludes to the Tabernacle and to us; for the Tabernacle and its successor the Temple are vehicles to house G-d's presence. This then helps us better understand the first paragraph on page 231 of our siddur, "Our eyes look forward to Your return to Zion in mercy! Blessed are you G-d, ever restoring Your presence to Zion."

New memory café launches for those living with dementia

Nearly a million people in the UK are living with dementia.

One in two of us will be affected by it in our lifetime – either as a patient or a carer.

"It touches us all," says Suri Poulos. "No one is immune." Her own brother was in his early 60s when he began to develop dementia, and since then, has been deteriorating rapidly. One of the hardest things for Suri's sister-in-law has been a limited opportunity to speak with others in a similar situation.

A new support group launching next month aims to provide that opportunity for the Maidenhead Synagogue community.

The memory cafe, set to run weekly on a Tuesday from 3-5 pm, will allow carers to connect with each other, as well as providing stimulation for those living with dementia, through gentle chair exercises, puzzles, questions about a favourite pastime or just playing and singing music from their youth.

Suri was asked to establish the cafe by Rabbi Rene, who knew that she had previously set up and run a daycare centre in Henley for those living with dementia. The first session will be on Tuesday 13 May but in order for it to run successfully, volunteers are needed.

Each session will rely on two volunteers, with initial support from Suri. No training is required – just a smile, warmth, and initiative. Please get in touch as soon as possible if you would like to help:

Pesach Message from the President 5785 / 2025

Pesach is the festival of freedom, where we celebrate our departure from Egypt. None of us needs to be reminded of the bitter parallels we have been experiencing since October 7th 2023, with hundreds of hostages taken on that awful day and held in captivity in awful conditions.

Since the signing of phase one of the ceasefire agreement we have experienced some joy and much heartbreak. There has been



celebration as hostages have emerged from their ordeal to be reunited with their families – among them fellow Brit Emily Damari. There has been concern at the condition of hostages who were released in ugly Hamas ceremonies emaciated and unwell. And of course, we all mourned as the coffins of hostages murdered by their captors were received by their distraught loved ones, including the precious Bibas family and Tsachi Idan, cousin of Board of Deputies' staff member Adam Maanit. It has been our absolute determination to campaign until the last hostage is out; with our Adopt a Hostage campaign and vigils outside Downing Street and the Scottish Parliament.

Since October 7th we have all suffered a surge of antisemitism. The UK community needs to feel safe, secure and protected. This is why we have set up a Commission on Antisemitism, led by the Government's Independent Adviser on Antisemitism Lord Mann and former Defence Secretary Penny Mordaunt. The Commission will investigate the rise of antisemitism in the UK and make far-reaching recommendations for how to fight antisemitism on our streets, in university campuses, in the media, online and in our workplaces.

Another key pledge I made in my election campaign was to tackle extremism and enhance interfaith relations with the Muslim community. Last year we launched the Optimistic Alliance between Jewish and Muslim communities in which we are tackling anti-Jewish and anti-Muslim hatred; challenging extremism and supporting mainstream voices; defending shared religious freedoms; confronting societal challenges like poverty and climate change; and finding ways to engage better over the Israeli-Palestinian conflict. I was proud to join rabbis from across the UK Jewish community as we presented the far-reaching Drumlanrig Muslim-Jewish Accords to King Charles III in February. There is a long way to go but we have a made a determined start.

I have spoken about the problems we face. However, we should also be celebrating our community and its achievements. I am pushing forward plans for a British Jewish Culture Month, with a proposed launch in 2026. In order to inoculate the public against the virus of antisemitism, we need to celebrate and educate about the contribution of our community to our country's society, economy and culture. I hope there will be much more to celebrate in the coming year.

We have gone through one of the toughest periods for the Jewish people in our living memory, but we have resilience in our DNA and we will come back stronger. It just remains for me to wish Pesach Sameach to you and your families from everyone at the Board of Deputies.
