Monthly Musings From Rabbi Rene

Shavuot

Someone asked me recently, "What's the purpose of Shavuot?"

"Cheesecake", was my immediate answer.

The truth is, Shavuot is less observed than Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur, or Pesach. And yet, in the overall Jewish narrative, if our ancestors became a people during the Exodus, they received a structure, a framework, only 50 days later on Shavuot (Hebrew for "weeks" — the seven weeks between both festivals). According to Torah, God revealed what was expected from us in a Hollywoodstyle narrative, with thunder and loud noises, with reverence and awe.

The fundamental teaching of Shavuot is that Torah wasn't given to isolated individuals, but to all of us, standing together. A beautiful Midrash teaches that all Jewish souls were present at Sinai - those of the people who lived that day,

those yet to be born in the future, and the proselytes who would join our community along the way.

Shavuot invites us to contemplate: what is our community, what is our purpose? We have received a law, but it's open to endless debates and interpretations. More importantly, we have received a sense of common purpose.

Recently, I've found myself drawn to the concept of the "Amen Effect," described in a book of the same name by Rabbi Sharon Brous. In essence, Rabbi Brous explains that when we affirm each other's experiences, when we see each other in truth, something powerful happens — connection. She writes, "When I hear your story and your struggles, and respond with 'amen', I am saying, 'I see you. Your experience matters." And somehow, we are both strengthened. This "Amen

Effect" manifests throughout our community - in conversations after services, in study groups, in how we show up for each other during both celebrations and challenges.

Rabbi Brous drew her inspiration from a passage in the Mishnah (Middot 2:2), which describes an ancient ritual when the Temple was still standing. During the pilgrimage festivals (Pesach, Sukkot and Shavuot), people would enter the courtvard from the south and walk clockwise. However, mourners would circle in the opposite direction. When the mourners were asked, "What happened to you?", they might share their pain: "My mother died," or "I found a lump." The community would then respond, "May God comfort you", or "May you be wrapped in the embrace of the community".

This was revealed at Sinai: we now have rules and values to live by, and above all, we have each other to face any challenges that life sends our way. We see in the other the face of God, and when

we meet someone in mourning, we show up and support them. Because it is the right thing to do. And because one day we will be the ones circling counterclockwise, welcoming the love and support of our community.

The question of Shavuot's relevance arose one Sunday morning during The Forum, a safe space for difficult conversations facilitated by the fantastic John Dunston. People come with different views, yet they listen to each other respectfully. We live in a time of heightened tensions, strong emotions, and significant challenges. I am proud to be the Rabbi of a community that has created within it a space where difficult conversations can happen in a menschlich way.

Kol ha-Kavod to you all, and Chag Shavuot Samecha.

The Torah is eternal. Yet we are required to learn subjects, such as the Holy Temples, the second of which was destroyed over two thousand years ago. The key is to apply rabbinical logic to ancient themes enabling us to glean timeless lessons for all mankind. Numbers chapter 5 includes two subjects that, on the surface, challenges our notion of relevance today. For today's commentary I will focus on chapter 5:11 - 31, known as the 'wayward wife'. Let me begin by stating that this practice was officially stopped over two thousand years ago, so let's look briefly at what this entails. In essence, a wife is suspected of having an adulterous relationship.

She was previously warned by her husband not to be secluded with this person and there were witnesses who saw her secluded with him. Mind you, that is not adultery so her husband is suspicious at best. If she denies being unfaithful she is brought to the priest and undergoes a humiliating test meant to prove if she is being honest.

The Hebrew word for the wayward wife is 'sota', which is related to the word 'shtoot' which translates as folly. There is a tractate in the Talmud called sota which expands upon the Torah and is traditionally read from Passover to Shavuot.

Parasha Naso – Numbers 5:1-31 – The parashah addresses priestly duties, camp purification, restitution for wrongs committed, the wife accused of unfaithfulness, the Nazirite, the Priestly Blessing, and consecration of the Tabernacle.

Coincidentally, our Torah portion is always read just before or just after Shavuot. What possible connection does the wayward wife have with the revelation at Mount Sinai?

Let's jump back to Exodus 20:17, Moses led the people out of the camp towards G-d, the people took their place at the foot of the mountain. G-d came down upon Mount Sinai and Moses went up. Jewish literature describes this event as a wedding between G-d and the Jewish people. The ketuba is the covenant between us and G-d. The ring, so to speak, is the Torah and the Ten Commandments spoken by G-d and written on two tablets of

stone. The holiday Shavuot is normally translated as 'weeks'; however, it can also be translated as 'oaths' for on this day G-d swore eternal devotion to us and we pledged everlasting loyalty to G-d. A wedding.

One of the key events on Shavuot is the reading of the Ten Commandments, which states, "You shall have no other G-d besides me" and continues, "You must not prostrate before them or worship them for I, your G-d am a jealous (kana) G-d".

It is when we stumble and fall. We are the wayward wife.

COUNCIL PORTFOLIO REPORTS

Your Council has had another busy year! The AGM report from each Portfolio is reprinted here for your convenience.



CHAIR - Martin Birch

Dear members, it's incredible what a difference a year makes. This time last year, we were all dealing with the prospect of Jonathan's retirement and what the future held for our community. We all did Jonathan proud by giving him a good

send off and thanked him for his tremendous 44 years in establishing our vibrant, inclusive, and caring community.

Now we have a new era with our dear new Rabbi Rene, who joined us last September. His relaxed style, humour, and caring manner make him a pleasure to listen to, and of course, he can sing. The services are more musical, and he brings joy to us with his soft and caring manner. Rene has made tremendous inroads to get to know our diverse community. I believe he has settled in extremely well and is respected by all who meet him.

I have worked closely with him to ensure he has the best support to deliver his role. Of course, that is also only possible with the huge help that everyone around provides. Agnes, Barbara, Alison, Graham and now Liya and Aaron are just incredible at maintaining the essential infrastructure of our synagogue. I would like to extend my personal thanks to them. We also have a huge volunteer base and teaching staff that brings a vibrancy to shul life. Thank you to those who do so much.

Now to council business. We have many exciting new projects ahead of us. Some are essential works, such as heating, but also the creation of a Jewish cultural/education room. Plans are currently being developed, and we hope by next Pesach to have this completed. We received a large donation and part of those funds are being utilised for this project. There is a raft of other projects

on the list, such as installing TVs in each classroom to assist teachers, and new AV systems to enhance online capability, so hopefully no more changing batteries mid-service.

I have agreed to stay in position until June 2026 and then relinquish my responsibilities as Chair. Jon Berman, who was responsible for buildings, has been great during his tenure, but has asked to step down. I asked Tony Nothman to step into this role, as he has extensive operational experience, which will help in future projects. Matt Loewenthal, security, has also asked to step down due to work commitments and Marcus Richards has agreed to take on this role. I would like to thank Vikki and Dave for their continued support. Without them, we would not be able to provide security. Over the coming months, we will be enhancing security further. New systems of entry are being explored and once plans have been agreed, we will instigate these measures which will create a more secure and safer environment.

Sue Henry is stepping down. She has been amazing with the environmental portfolio and has secured a silver EcoJudaism award for the synagogue for all the efforts in making us more environmentally sustainable - thank you. We are seeking a new eco warrior. Please let me know if you are interested in taking on this role. In communications, Elizabeth, who has been exemplary at producing Hadashot, has handed the magazine over to an editorial team that continues to produce this excellent publication. A massive thank you to all the team.

In terms of finance, we are in a strong position but still need further funds to support some of our ongoing projects. We would very much welcome any donation to assist us in our objectives. We will also be undertaking a review of the membership fee structure to ensure fairness across the membership.

Finally, I would like to say that the energy and passion I see across the board with synagogue life is great, and I would urge you to show up as much as you can to breathe further life into our vibrant community. If you have ideas, want changes, or want to do more activities, please step up.

VICE-CHAIR - Lincoln Ball

Thank you to everyone who contributes to keeping Maidenhead Synagogue a safe place to visit and work at. The focus during the year has been to further improve the health and safety systems at the shul following a positive health and safety

audit in 2024. Over the last 12 months, we have instigated quarterly in-house health and safety inspections and an annual fire risk assessment. We continue to incorporate good health and safety practice in everything we do, including health and safety induction and knowledge retention for employees.

A big thank you to our staff members Aaron Kader and Agnes Fixler, who contribute significantly to the shul's Health and Safety sub-committee. The shul council is grateful to the generosity of WGC Ltd, which significantly supports our ability to provide a professional IT support service.

Thank you also to the local fire and rescue service, who kindly donated surplus screens, keyboards and mice that helped facilitate the recent admin office move.

We have continued to experience a few issues with the reliability of our Shabbat streaming service and every time that happens, the team investigates what issue caused the disruption. We have improved the availability of the internet service for the security team, as they move around the premises on their duties.

Using computers and screens throughout the building is now easier since the WiFi service was extended to every classroom.

The shul's internet access is still restricted because of the existing copper cables, with the introduction of full fibre not expected for another year. However, we have been able to run some successful events over the past year that relied on a good internet service.

BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS - Tony Nothman

Having recently taken over this portfolio, my report is based on the good work done by my predecessor Jon Berman. I'd like to put on record my thanks for his work, knowledge and

advice as he passes the baton.

As in previous years, we strive to develop and maintain our building and grounds in the most efficient and effective manner. This is an ongoing task and one that takes considerable effort from all those involved, not least because as our building ages, it requires more attention. I know I am repeating the statement by many of my predecessors but the cost of maintaining our buildings is significant and expenditure is both necessary and important for our community.

There is a programme of gradual improvements across our estate that we are working through both externally and internally. These include painting and decoration, but also several health, safety and security upgrades. My thanks to Aaron Kader, our Site Manager, for his hard work and commitment on much of this.

I must also acknowledge the work of our gardening team, led by Steve and Liz Yates. Our grounds are a fabulous asset and one that we want the community to enjoy, but it does require significant work. We are always looking for willing volunteers!

Alongside our ongoing maintenance, we have several major projects aimed at making us more energy efficient and reducing our carbon footprint - for instance, electricity generated through our solar panel roof installation.

Our current heating, lighting and related systems are not all as resilient or efficient as we need them to be. We need to be able to control all our systems across the entire building, regardless of how often each area is used. New technology will help us to do this in an efficient and effective way.



COMMUNICATIONS – Elizabeth Prais

Our community uses three main communication channels to keep members updated with what is going on: Hadashot, weekly emails, and the website.

In 2024, there were a baker's dozen issues of Hadashot, including a special edition for Rabbi Romain's retirement. Katharine Rooney and Sapir Tal took over as Editors of Hadashot in early 2025.

Rabbi Rene sends out a weekly email containing the most up-to-date event information and news from the wider Jewish community.

Our website is our online home and contains the livestream link for Shabbat Services, a Business Directory for members, and articles that are too long to be included in Hadashot.

Looking at the year ahead, we are working on streamlining the Weekly Email, making booking and paying for shul events easier, and increasing our Social Media presence.

COMMUNITY CARE – Lucy Henning

We have a small core of volunteers who visit our members as part of the Tea and Chat initiative. If you know someone who might benefit from this service, please contact me.

Our Caller Team is in contact with about 100 members at Pesach and Rosh Hashanah. This past year, we sent out around 300 handwritten greeting cards to our senior community members at Rosh Hashanah and Pesach.

Our provision of lifts to appointments has always been a much-appreciated service, and we are greatly indebted to everyone who has volunteered to help.

We have been considering how to evolve the connections available via our networks to help improve our support systems.

Our inaugural Wellbeing Shabbat in February was a great success and will now be an annual event. We had a lot of positive feedback and discussed new ideas and initiatives.

Shalom Counselling is available for any member of the community and their family who are looking for psychological support. We offer six free sessions of confidential counselling.

We always need more people to help, either regularly or on an ad hoc basis. Please contact me on lucy.henning@maidshul.org if you can volunteer.



EDUCATION AND PROJECTS – Till Gins

Dale Resnick, a local secondary school sixth form teacher and our very own post b'nei mitzvah teacher, is running revision support/social sessions. Students can tap into his expertise, ask for advice on all things from exam strategies to well-being/resilience and revise together in the same space with friends. This will continue to run next year.

Rabbi Rene led the antisemitism support group for parents of children and university students. Thank you to him and everyone who has helped support our youth this year.

A journey from Topol to Torah

It was Fiddler on the Roof that started it all. Avielah Barclay remembers watching the film repeatedly as a child, at her father's movie theatre in Prince George – a town in the north of British Columbia, Canada. "That really stuck with me", she said. It was one of the reasons she became fascinated by Hebrew calligraphy, which she painstakingly taught herself.



Years later, living in London, Barclay met the film's star, Chaim Topol, backstage at Regent's Park Theatre, where he was performing in the musical Gigi. "We had quite a long chat at the bar", she says. "He was very nice." (Her husband had organised the meeting as a birthday surprise).

By then, Barclay had trained as a soferet – a female Torah scribe – in Jerusalem, after facing a good deal of resistance and searching far and wide for a teacher who would take her on. She was certified as a soferet in 2003 – the first woman in modern times to do so.

As well as writing scrolls (and other Hebrew documents, such as Megillat Esther and ketubot), Barclay repairs them. Rabbi Rene invited her to come and inspect Maidenhead's Torah scrolls, one of which is on loan from the Memorial Scrolls Trust (MST), which looks after historic Czech scrolls, including over 1,500 that had been saved after the Second World War.

Barclay estimates that Maidenhead's MST scroll dates from the early 1800s, and it has a few quirks, like having 54 lines per column – a non-standard layout. Her assessment is that both scrolls will need a few repairs. Typically, this work includes things like fixing some of the ink in the lettering (if a crack goes right through it, it's no longer kosher) or repairing loose stitching.

While some soferim now use fountain pens to make their work faster, Barclay prefers the sharp edges she gets from using a quill: "That's how you get your very best lettering", she says. "It's part of the art and the craft – the traditional practice – and I see myself as a protector of that tradition."

Avielah Barclay will give a talk at the synagogue on Thursday, 5 June at 7 pm. It will be an interactive session, with the opportunity to learn both about the art of Hebrew calligraphy and about scroll repairs.


